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Aggregation Overview


- What is a Municipal Aggregation Program?**
 A Municipal Aggregation allows communities to form a buying group on behalf of their citizens with the intent that a larger buying group may acquire better pricing and more favorable terms and conditions for the citizens than if they shop on their own.
- Who Governs a Municipal Aggregation Program?**
 The Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO) has developed strict guidelines for forming and running a Municipal Aggregation Program.
- Who Can Create a Municipal Aggregation Program?**
 Townships, Villages, Cities and Counties.

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Aggregations: Beyond Price...

Aggregation is about the entire value of the programs

- Gives residents a simpler energy solution including...
 - Price
 - Terms and Conditions
 - No Termination Fees
 - “Revolving Door” for entering/leaving program
 - Ability to provide additional Renewable Energy

As market conditions and utility rates are always changing, aggregation brings price protection and stability to the residents



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What Changes, Or Does Not Change?

- Duke Ohio will continue to deliver electricity to homes or businesses, so they should be contacted for any questions or issues related to losing power or the “Duke Ohio Charges” portion of the bill.
- Residents will continue to receive one bill from Duke Ohio with only one section of the bill changing to reflect the new supplier charges.
- Budget billing and/or other payment arrangements with Duke Ohio will continue in effect.



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Ballot Language


